

Trinity River Corridor Project model to be unveiled

The Trinity Trust will unveil the 20-foot-long Trinity Model of the Trinity River Corridor Project – created by nationally renowned model makers **Charles** and **Susie Kendrick** of Dallas – on Sept. 9 at the Trinity Center, 1444 Oak Lawn Ave., Suite 200.

The detailed model depicts major components inside and outside the levees, including replicas of the Calatrava signature bridges – the Margaret Hunt Hill Bridge and the Margaret McDermott Bridge. (The city hopes to build a third Calatrava bridge, but it is unfunded.)

It also features two urban lakes, an island, ball fields, a whitewater course, gateway parks such as Moore Park Gateway, residences and businesses along and around the Trinity River.

The model will be open for public viewing from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Sept. 9.

From Sept. 10 on, the exhibit will be open to the public from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays through Fridays.

The exhibit was underwritten by **Alon USA** through the auspices of president and chief executive **Jeff Morris.**

The projected \$2 billion Trinity River Corridor Project is the largest public works and urban development project in the history of Dallas, and one of the largest in the nation.

It is designed to reduce flood damage, improve downtown traffic congestion and encourage development along the Trinity River.

Internationally known architect **Santiago Calatrava**, designed the Margaret Hunt Hill Bridge, now under construction. And construction on the Margaret McDermott Bridge begins in 2011.

The **Trinity River Audubon Center**, at Loop 12 east of Interstate 45, will open in October, and work is under way on the Moore Park Gateway to expand and renovate the park.

An expanded system of pedestrian trails is planned for the Trinity River Corridor Project as well as the Texas Horse Park.
